Workshop 1 "Do As You Say or Do As We Do" in the Cramond Room

The workshop will begin with a presentation from the three youth facilitators, which will largely
focus on how young people use the internet and how this affects how the internet grows and
develops. Specific attention will be given to three main aspects identified by these young internet
users:

- Multimedia
- Research
- Communication

The presentation will set the scene for the workshop which will continue with the audience breaking up into small round table discussion, which will further explore the chosen issues with a view to considering a framework whereby young people can embrace the internet in a safer way. Opportunity for feedback and general discussion will be incorporated into the given time allocation.

Workshop 2 "Making a difference - how to translate engagement into change" in the Newhaven Lecture Theatre

This workshop will explore how all concerned have responsibility for making an engagement process effective - in that it has a real impact.

The workshop will be discussion-based and invite the views and experiences of all participants. Themes for deliberation will include:

- what young people expect to result from their contributions
- how the policy making process works and how contributions are assessed
- what are the blockages to making connections between the contributions of young people and policy making and how might these be removed
- how the HUWY connects to the current UK policy agenda
- whether we can sum up and form any conclusions and principles which HUYW might take forward
